

Executive Summary Acknowledgements

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The Herbert Taylor Nature Preserve project began with the receipt of applications from the Friends of Herbert Taylor in May of 08. This project was selected for Visioning out of several others that were received that same year. The land was a new acquisition through a joint effort with Watershed Management and the Parks Department. The new acquisition comprises 56 acres of pristine woodland and Utoy Creek. The greenspace is located at Boulder Park Drive at Dollar Mill Rd. SW in the Adamsville Neighborhood of Atlanta.

The Steering Committee comprised several committed community leaders from the surrounding neighborhood. The Committee met monthly to discuss how to engage the wider community and to make decisions based on community input at public meetings. The committee scheduled four public meetings to be held at the Adamsville Recreation Center:

- Visioning Meeting, June 27, 2009, 10:30 AM
- Design Workshop, July 25, 2009, 10:30 AM
- Preliminary Design Review, August 29, 2009, 10:30 AM
- Final Design Review and Prioritization Meeting, October 10, 2009, 10:30 AM

During the Visioning process, it was noted that the community preferred to refer to the property as a Nature Preserve, not a park.

The plan included herein is meant to serve as a documentation of the community's agreed projects and priorities for Herbert Greene Nature Preserve. The graphic plan illustrates concepts and is not considered to be a set of construction documents. It will take cooperation from the City, the neighbors, and the greater Atlanta community to construct all the changes in and between the parks. The Steering Committee will serve an ongoing role in spearheading the changes to the park, finding funding sources, and overseeing project development. Park Pride will continue to serve as a liason between the community and potential funding sources, including the City of Atlanta. It is expected that the entire build-out of the improvements proposed for the Herbert Greene Nature Preserve will take years, if not decades to complete. The first step, determining the best ways to improve the Nature Preserve is completed and another chapter in its redevelopment can begin.


