

Spink - Collins Park Conceptual Master Plan







Executive Summary Spink Collins Park

Spink Collins Park is located in the revitalizing and growing Collins Park neighborhood in west Atlanta. The neighborhood is very diverse in cultural, income, and educational levels. Still, there is a tight-knit community forming with an active citizenry. The park parallels Spink Street on the upper end and Collins Drive dead-ends into the park at an unfinished bridge that connects the park entrance to the neighborhood.

The 21 acre park is heavily wooded with a stream running through it. Invasive species are well-established in the lower-lying areas but the higher ground is rich in a variety of native plant species. There are existing ruins of old stone buildings, steps, and walls on the property. The park land was donated, but never developed. There was a period of time when it was unclear if the land was a public park or was privately owned. Recently, that was clarified and neighbors have been actively trying to make the land usable as a park. Community members have worked very hard to remove truckloads of illegally-disposed-of tires, cut pedestrian paths through the thick privet, uncovered vegetation and debris off the existing ruins, built picnic tables, installed plant identification (interpretive) signs, and regularly schedule volunteer days to keep the park looking clean and tidy.

The Kick-Off meeting was July 26, 2006. The Committee met monthly from then until March 10, 2007. During that time, neighborhood surveys were conducted, four public meetings were widely advertised and held, and the final plans were developed. The Steering Committee has sought and received Neighborhood Association approval and Neighborhood Planning Unit (NPU) approval. The Steering Committee is still strongly active in their park. More community members have become active, and the group is eager to implement parts of their conceptual master plan.
